## Chairman's Notes

At the Annual General Meeting, your committee raised the issue of the finances of the club and the thorny question of whether to increase the cost of attending meetings. This received the not unexpected unenthusiastic response from those members present and the question was postponed to a later meeting when “a more representative” group of members could be consulted. Putting to one side the comment that the A.G.M. is the time for members of the club to express their views and that the attendance should reflect those most active in the club's affairs, it is a question that will have to be considered at some time.

It is possible that we did not manage to put over a full view of the club's finances and that members were left with an impression that year on year balances were remaining fairly constant and that, on that basis, there was little to worry about. The facts are somewhat different.

We endeavour to provide a full programme of high class demonstrators. The fees that they charge are increasing and, in particular, travel costs are becoming more significant as fuel prices continue upwards.

Club income for the year was greater than normal due to pressure from the AWGB to pull in club subscriptions early. This meant that the year end balance included money that would normally have appeared in next year's finances.

Recent expenditure on club equipment has been minimal over the last few years. This situation may not continue. We have been looking to upgrade the club's camera and projection equipment. Any such action will not be cheap. We presently rely on club members to provide lathes for use at outside events such as the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust. These lathes may not always be available and we should, perhaps, consider the purchase of a second smaller club lathe.

Lastly, club membership is not yet showing signs of an increase although we continue to promote club through our attendance at outside events. I would urge you to think seriously about the overall situation when the question is raised again.

## Club Annual General Meeting Minutes - Prepared by the Club Secretary

Friday January 10<sup>th</sup> 2014

1) **Apologies.** There were no apologies

2) **Chairman's report.**

"This is my first report to the club, having stepped into the position of Chairman last January. I have been well supported throughout the year by the committee, some of whom were equally finding their way into new positions.

Geoff Payne laid the foundations for the year's programme and remained on the committee long enough to provide a good handover to Ted Gill, before resigning to make way for Dawn Hopley. We were pleased to see her back in circulation and taking an active part in the club's activities.

We said good bye to John Smith, a former Chairman, who died in June. He had long been a very active member and will be missed.

The majority of the club's meetings were well received although a couple of demonstrators failed to live up to their reputations and our expectations. This is one of the trials for the Events Secretary in seeking to widen the range of our speakers. Attendance levels were mixed. The additional meeting laid on in August and featuring Curt Theobald, an eminent American turner attracted some visitors from other clubs but not in the numbers that we had hoped, the club attendance was also disappointingly low.

We attended Alrewas and Kings Bromley Shows, sweeping the board in the competitions at the latter show. Two visits to the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust took place. The first in February was marred by poor weather and attendance levels were low. The Christmas Fayre was far more successful and made contributions to the Trust, Club Funds and certain members also were able to sell some of their pieces. We take these opportunities to spread the word about MSWA and hope that they will translate into new members.

Overall, membership levels remain my greatest concern. The programmes that we endeavour to provide rely heavily on outside demonstrators and their costs increase, particularly if they have to travel significant distances. The Treasurer's Report will, I am sure, outline the financial issues that this may create over time.

Finally I must give my thanks for the support of all of the Committee and look forward to that continuing throughout 2014."

### **Points arising from Treasurer's report:**

- The cost of demonstrators is the biggest expenditure alongside insurances and hall hire.
- Concerns raised about the monthly attendance fee (currently £3.00) as this alongside members fees does not currently cover our annual costs at this moment in time. The committee would like to recommend a fee of £5.00 each month. This is to be raised at a meeting in the new year.
- It was decided that we will circulate demonstration details to other local clubs on a month by month basis.

## Useful websites and suppliers

Steve is a member of Coombe Abbey Turners and has a massive stock of timber which he is happy to sell to turners and woodworkers. The timber consists mostly of locally sourced native hardwoods, planked and kiln dried, and is available at great prices; some really lovely stuff. Steve lives in Sapcote in Leicestershire, not too far away, and close enough to Axminster in Nuneaton for a joint visit! In Kingsbury Water Park they have created a log yard and have a large supply of various timbers. It would appear that they are bringing all the forestry felling for North Warwickshire to this site for disposal. They have large pieces down to branches and sections from Birch, Oak, Beech and other locally grown woods. Please note that these are "green", although some of the larger pieces have been there for a year or two. The only downside is that you have to pay £3.50 to get into the car park. ### Custom Toolrests – David Fields

David's grandson is able to make tool-rests, similar to the Robert Sorby system, out of round steel bar. These can be tailored to suit your requirements i.e. tool-post stem and length of the actual tool-rest. At the moment he is only doing straight tool-rests but bowl rests may be feasible in the future.

And if you have a Record lathe and do small spindles, he has developed a cranked tool-post, allowing the tool-rest to get close to the work, without the banjo dropping off the front bed bar.

### Carnauba wax polishes – Paul Bellamy

Following the favourable reaction to the polishing kits Paul started earlier this year, he has established a supply of carnauba wax flakes. These can be used to make your own 'sticks' or mixed with other components to make a range of polishes. He is selling these in 250g bags but could do larger quantities if you need it. He also has some ready-made wax blocks, comprising 60% beeswax/ 40% carnauba. These are softer than most 'wood-turning sticks' but he prefers this as it doesn't score your work.

He also has more of his 'Buffing kits', similar to Chestnut's system. For more details, e-mail him at
